## Task: Te Toa me te Hōia — Warriors and Soldiers

Approach: One to one

 Focus:
 Students can identify and describe the features and meanings of sculptures

 ources:
 2 pictures: carved Māori warrior, war memorial soldier

 Kupu:
 whakapakoko = statue/sculpture

## Questions / instructions:

Anei ngā pikitia e rua o ētahi whakapakoko. Āta whakaarohia te take i hangaia ai ēnei whakapakoko e rua. Whakaaturia ngā pikitia e rua, taha ki te taha.

I'm going to show you two pictures of sculptures, and I want you to think about why they were made. Show the two pictures alongside each other.

Titiro ki te pikitia o te whakairo Māori.

- 3. What do you think would be a good name or title for this sculpture?
