Resources: Video, five proverb cards, 4 pictures.

Commentary

There is a distinct growth in ability to understand, interpret and explain the underlying meanings in legends and proverbs from year 4 to year 8, although quite high numbers of students at both levels struggled to identify the messages intended in the two traditional tales as they related to human enterprises. Year 8 students, in particular, were more confident in the part of the task that required them to identify parellels between traditional contexts and contemporary activities.
